Is electricity still good value? Short answer: Yes.

Grocery costs keep climbing, no one fills their tank and says, "That was cheap," and yes — for some members, electricity bills have gone up too. So, we think it's fair for you to ask: Am I still getting good value for what I pay?

Yes, very much so. But let's take a step back.

A single latte can cost \$6. A lunch outing? Around \$10 for fast food. A streaming subscription? A recent survey found the average family spends \$69 a month on streaming services. Add it up, and many households spend hundreds of dollars a month on short-term conveniences.

Now compare that to electricity, where the average Clay Electric member pays about \$5.87 a day. That single daily cost powers your entire home — lights, hot water, cooking, cooling, charging devices, and keeping food fresh. For less than the price of a coffee, electricity delivers comfort and convenience — all day, every day.
